We are excited to share with you the attached list of books for the 2020-2021 HK Battle of the Books. Multiple copies of all books will be available for borrowing from the school library in September. If you want to read them sooner, you can purchase these titles from any bookshop, or borrow them from the public library. We will use these books as follows:

<u>Step 1: Reading for Points</u> – Students who read the first five books (*Stargazing, New Kid, Bunnicula, Marsh and Me, The Wild Robot*) in the attached booklist before September 1 will get five blue stars, and they will get three blue stars for finishing the first five books before September 20.

<u>Step 2: In-School Battle</u> – Students who have read the first five books are welcome to enter the SSCPS In-School Battle to be held at the school auditorium in late-September. Students will be grouped into teams and asked to name the book in questions such as, "In which book is a girl's idol a K-pop singer?" and "In which book is a bunny suspected of being a vampire?"

<u>Step 3: HK Battle of the Books</u> – A maximum of 20 students will be invited to attend weekly workshops during school hours and some additional sessions nearer the competition as required. Together, the team will read the rest of the books on the list, gain in-depth knowledge of these books and train for the territory-wide HK Battle of the Books to be held in May 2021. A final team of 12 students will be selected to represent SSCPS at this fun and friendly competition. Please note that by joining the school team, students are expected to read these books and complete associated tasks.

Stargazing	Jen Wang	A graphic novel about two Chinese-American girls who become best friends despite being very different from each other, and one of the ends up fighting for her life in the hospital.
		Experiences: friendship, jealousy, Chinese-American culture, illness
New Kid	Jerry Craft	A graphic novel about a boy who loves to draw cartoons. Instead of going to art school of his dreams, his parents enroll him at a prestigious private school where diversity is low and the struggle to fit in is real.
		Experiences: humour, new school, racism, African-American culture, New York City
Bunnicula	Deborah & James Howe	This is a humorous tale about the attempts of Harold the gentle dog and Chester the brilliant cat to find out the truth about the newest pet in their home, a bunny that they suspect may actually be a vampire.
		Experiences: comedy-mystery, adventure, family pets
Marsh and Me	Martine Murray	A short Australian novel narrated in the first person by a shy, lonely music-loving boy who finds his secret place on a hill invaded by a strange girl who is building a fort that resembles a spaceship.
		Experiences: new friends, courage to come out of shell, loss of a parent
The Wild Robot	Peter Brown	This illustrated and action-packed fantasy is about a robot that wakes up on a remote island, and not only survives but also thrives.
		Experiences: action adventure, survival, nature & technology, family
Operation Frog Effect	Sarah Scheerger	A heartwarming story told in eight perspectives (including one in graphic novel form) by students in Ms. Graham's class who unite for a cause they all believe in.

Ban this Book	Alan Gratz	A fourth-grader fights back when her favorite book – <i>From the Mixed-Up Files of Mrs. Basil E. Frankweiler</i> – is banned from the school library.

Heartbeat	Sharon Creech	A story-in-verse that uses poetry forms to tell the story of a young girl's attempts to make sense of changes around her, from a mother who is pregnant and a forgetful grandfather to her moody friend Max.

The Boy at the Back of the Class	Onjali Q. Raúf	This humorous and heartful story offers a child's perspective on the refugee crisis, highlighting the importance of friendship and kindness in a world that doesn't always make sense.
		Experiences: school life, friendship, Syrian refugee, making the world a better place
The Remarkable Journey of Coyote Sunrise	Dan Gemeinhart	A heartwarming adventure about a girl traveling the American countryside with her father in a refurbished school bus after a terrible car accident killed her mother and two sisters.

Lampie and the Children of the Sea	Annet Schaap	Lampie the lighthouse keeper's daughter helps her disabled father at the lighthouse, and gets drawn into an enchanting world of mermaids, pirates and stormy seas.
